Gender Equality and Social Inclusion Week 2025: Advancing Inclusion in the Pacific

From 10–14 February, the Pacific Islands Forum Secretariat (PIFS) in Suva hosted Gender Equality and Social Inclusion (GESI) Week 2025, bringing together officials, civil society, and Pacific Organization for Persons with Disabilities for meaningful dialogue on equality and inclusion.


With support from IDA and AWID, six persons with disabilities from Fiji, Kiribati, Samoa, and Tonga participated in the event. The week's discussions come ahead of key global forums including CSW69, the Global Disability Summit, and COSP18, offering Pacific voices a platform to shape international priorities on gender and disability inclusion.












These questions are designed to collect disaggregated data to help identify persons with disabilities within the population.



The training aimed to deepen their understanding of the government's international commitments under the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (UNCRPD) and how these obligations translate into advancing the rights of persons with disabilities through data collection and analysis.



Staff Deepen Understanding of Disability Rights Through CRPD Training

The Pacific Disability Forum recently held an internal training on the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (UNCRPD), facilitated by Member Services Officer Savaira Tinai.

The session offered staff a valuable opportunity to revisit the core principles of the Convention and explore how each article connects directly to their daily work. Through interactive discussions and real-life examples, the team strengthened their understanding of disability rights and how to apply them across areas like education, health, employment, and public services.









GESI Week Continues....

The sessions were divided into two during day 3 of the GESI Week, **Gender Equality and Disability Inclusion**.

The spotlight was on Disability Inclusion in the Pacific, with engaging discussions and interactive sessions generating meaningful insights. Participants explored how the Pacific can amplify its priorities for 2025 and beyond, focusing on strategic engagement at major international events like the Global Disability Summit (GDS) and the Conference of States Parties to the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (COSPCRPD) that will take place in April and June respectively.



Quick Reference Guide." This guide aims to address an essential gap that PDF has been advocating for: ensuring that disability remains a central focus in GEDSI approaches, with the necessary expertise dedicated to the unique challenges faced by people with disabilities.

This resource is designed to be used by GEDSI advisors, development practitioners, and researchers throughout GEDSI analysis phases to ensure that disability rights and equity are fully incorporated. It highlights critical issues and considerations for individuals with disabilities who are most at risk of being left behind, reinforcing the importance of inclusive development.

We strongly encourage the widespread adoption of the "Disability in GEDSI Analysis: Quick Reference Guide," developed in collaboration with the disability movement. Let's work together to make sure no one is left behind.

- Kiribati Association of Blind and Visual Impairment


The assessments focused on key areas such as governance, finance systems, and program capacity. Difficult but important conversations helped uncover real challenges and set the foundation for targeted support.

In addition, we supported KDA in developing their new strategic plan, with board members and staff engaging in two days of collaborative planning.

Shaping the Future of Inclusive Education in the Pacific

The Pacific Disability Forum recently took part in the Pacific Regional Inclusive Education Paiaudaud held in Pohnpei, Federated States of Micronesia.

The event brought together Pacific Heads of Education Systems and senior inclusive education representatives from 15 Pacific Island Countries to focus on building more inclusive education systems across the region.

Key discussions addressed policy, data, human resources, and advocacy, with participants sharing country-specific insights and prioritizing recommendations from the Pacific Regional Inclusive Education Review (PRIEF) 2025–2030.

Special attention was given to the needs of neurodivergent and autistic learners, and strategies to monitor progress at all levels of education.



Strengthening OPD Partnerships in Kiribati

As part of our #GrowingStrongerTogether program, PDF met with the Australian High Commission in Kiribati to share updates on our work with local OPDs. Meeting with First Secretary Mr. Ryan Kinder, we highlighted the importance of institutional strengthening, governance, and compliance—key to helping OPDs become trusted partners and access direct aid.

Supported by DFAT's Disability Equity and Rights Strategy, we're committed to ensuring persons with disabilities are at the centre of development.

For us, equity means:

Disability-specific and inclusive mainstream services Reaching rural and remote communities Adequate government resourcing Donor support from policy to practice



The Pacific Disability Forum (PDF) was honoured to participate in the Pacific Child Wellbeing Summit held in Suva, Fiji, alongside Ministers, senior officials, and partners from across 17 Pacific Island countries. The three-day event provided a valuable platform to promote inclusive and holistic approaches to child wellbeing in our region.

Representing PDF, CEO Sainimili Tawake contributed to the dialogue by emphasising the importance of disability inclusion in all efforts to safeguard and nurture children across the Blue Pacific Continent. Her address reinforced that children with disabilities must be an integral part of all regional strategies aimed at ensuring safe, healthy, and enabling environments for every child.





Solomon Islands Mission







Violet Savu, the Monitoring, Evaluation, Accountability and Learning (MEAL) Officer for the Pacific Disability Forum (PDF), recently undertook a monitoring and evaluation mission in the Solomon Islands to assess PDF-supported projects in partnership with local Organisations of Persons with Disabilities (OPDs).

The visit built on last year's collaboration between PDF, PWDSI, BVIPSI, and the Ministry of Education to promote inclusive education for children with disabilities. As part of a BVIPSI delegation, Ms. Savu engaged in discussions with senior ministry officials on strengthening inclusive practices, enhancing teacher training—particularly in braille and inclusive methods—and preparing for a school heads' training on the CRPD and the right to education.



The Regional Reference Group for the "Improving Education Access and Quality Learning for Deaf Children in the Pacific" project held its fourth and final meeting, bringing together PDF's Acting Manager Inclusive Development, Sisi Coalala, alongside partners from MFAT, USP, Deaf Oceania, and regional deaf representatives. This five-year initiative, supported by MFAT and implemented in Cook Islands, Fiji, Niue, Tonga, and Vanuatu, focused on strengthening inclusive education for deaf learners by building teacher capacity, improving sign language services, supporting early intervention, empowering families, and ensuring deaf voices influence policy and planning.



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Pacific Disability Inclusive Resilience Development Strategy 2025–2035 Launch



The Pacific Disability Forum (PDF), in partnership with UN Women Fiji MCO, launched the Pacific Disability Inclusive Resilience Development Strategy 2025-2035 at the Grand Pacific Hotel in Suva, Fiji. This milestone strategy integrates disability inclusion into disaster risk management and climate resilience efforts across the Pacific. Key remarks from Ms. Hulola Ouma (UN Women Fiji), Ms. Sofia Temby (Australian High Commission), and PDF CEO Ms. Sainimili Tawake underscored the importance of leaving no one behind-particularly persons with disabilities—as the region confronts climate change and natural disasters. Launched ahead of International Women's Day 2025, the strategy reinforces commitments to genderresponsive and disability-inclusive resilience, especially for women and girls with disabilities. This 10-year roadmap calls for strengthened partnerships and inclusive action across all sectors to ensure a resilient Pacific for all.









Pacific Disability Forum at CRPD 32nd Session 4th March 2025

PDF attended the 32nd session of the CRPD Committee in Geneva to support our Tuvalu member OPD, Fusi Alofa.

Fusi Alofa had submitted its Shadow Report and participated in the dialogue, private briefing with the Committee, and observed questions directed at the Tuvalu Government. Ms. Mine Pilikosi, President of Fusi Alofa, represented the organization at the meeting.

PDF and the International Disability Alliance supported Fusi Alofa in Geneva. This engagement was part of our commitment to building the capacity of our members, enabling them to be strong advocates and voices for persons with disabilities in their countries.















PDF provides support Registerations and Communications support to FDPF for Kadavu Outreach Program

The Fiji Disabled Peoples Federation (FDPF), in partnership with the Pacific Disability Forum with support from the Ministry of Health & Medical Services (MHMS) 2024/2025 Grant, successfully conducted a Sexual Reproductive Health (SRH) outreach program in the five districts of Kadavu. The aim was to increase awareness and understanding of Sexual and Reproductive Health Rights (SRHR) and expand access to SRH services among women

and young people with and without disabilities.

Advancing Inclusion: PDF Joins Regional Dialogue on GEDSI in Weather Ready Pacific

The Pacific Disability Forum (PDF) was pleased to participate in a well-attended regional convening held over two days in Nadi, which brought together voices from the Pacific women's movement, organisations of persons with disabilities (OPDs), faith-based organisations, and civil society.

PDF CEO Sainimili Tawake joined the discussions aimed at shaping an inclusive, co-designed pathway to mainstream Gender Equality, Disability and Social Inclusion (GEDSI) into the Weather Ready Pacific (WRP) decadal programme. This gathering marked an important step in ensuring GEDSI is meaningfully integrated into early warning systems and climate preparedness in the Pacific.







Strengthening CRPD Understanding: PDF Leads National Training in Tonga

The Pacific Disability Forum (PDF), in partnership with UNICEF, successfully led a 5-day national training on the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD) from 17-21 March 2025 in Tonga. The training targeted members of the Disability Taskforce, including representatives from government ministries and organisations of persons with disabilities, to strengthen their understanding and implementation of the CRPD.







Strengthening Ties for Inclusion: PDF CEO Meets with Australian Consul General in New Caledonia

Australian Consulate General in New
Caledonia, with support from DFAT
Suva Post. The meeting focused on
strengthening collaboration to support
disability inclusion efforts, particularly
through engagement with Collectif
Handicaps in Noumea.

Discussions covered opportunities to enhance support and access to resources for persons with disabilities, as well as ongoing DFAT programs promoting disability equity across the Pacific. PDF extends sincere appreciation to the Government and people of Australia for their continued commitment to advancing disability-inclusive development in the region.







This week, the Pacific Disability Forum (PDF) conducted capacity-building training in Timor-Leste for Disability Resource Teams (DRTs) under the AHP Disaster Ready 2.0 Plus project. The sessions focused on Disaster Risk Management, Climate Change Adaptation, and Disability Inclusion in Community-Based Disaster Risk Management (CBDRM).



Working alongside AHP partners—World Vision, CARE, Oxfam, Plan, and Caritas—PDF aimed to strengthen the resilience of persons with disabilities, especially women, youth, and children, to disaster and climate impacts. The visit also included meetings with DFAT and UNICEF to reinforce efforts toward disability—inclusive disaster preparedness. Action planning with DRTs remains a key step in ensuring all emergency initiatives are accessible and inclusive.









A meeting was held between the Honourable Minister Sinaitakala Tuitahi and the CEO of the Pacific Disability Forum (PDF), Sainimili Tawake from Fiji, along with representatives from Tonga's Organisations of Persons with Disabilities (OPDs), at their office, to discuss the current state of disability-related initiatives in Tonga.

Also present at the meeting were Deputy Director of the National Social Safety and Security Division, Luisa Manuofetoa, and other staff members from the Division.

Ms Tawake also pays a visit to the Ministry of Women, Tonga to discuss possibility of the current government to host the next PRCD, it is also a courtesy visit to discuss possible ways to effectively collaborate with the 4 OPD's.



Nadi, Fiji

The event brought together together partners from across the Pacific to reflect on the region's journey in assistive technology, share real-life impact stories, and commit to future action through the Blue Pacific Vision.

The World Health Organization (WHO) has advanced assistive technology (AT) access in the Pacific by supporting the Pacific Priority Assistive Product List (APL) and a proposal for a Regional Facility. These initiatives guide national policy, procurement, and service delivery, promoting AT as a human right essential for inclusion. Developed through inclusive consultations, regional data collection, and collaboration with partners including the Pacific Disability Forum (PDF), PRATA, and SPC, the APL reflects input from 141 respondents across 14 Pacific Island Countries and lists 43 prioritized products in seven functional domains. WHO continues to advocate for regional coordination, technical support, and sustainable systems to ensure equitable AT access for all.

Participants explored key strategies for sustainable access, the supply chain behind assistive tech, and innovations for school-aged children.

The momentum built today sets the stage for deeper collaboration and action in the coming days to strengthen assistive technology access across the region.



Growing Stronger Together

Nadi, Fiji

The Growing Stronger Together (GST) Workshop brought together Organisations of Persons with Disabilities (OPDs) from across the Pacific for a powerful week of learning, reflection, and collaboration. Through group activities, case study sharing, and strategic discussions, OPDs had the opportunity to reflect on their journeys, review core funding acquittals, and engage in peer learning.

A key highlight was the interactive session on the Pacific Disability Forum's Strategic Plan, where OPDs shared their voices and provided valuable input to shape the future direction of the Forum. The workshop also fostered deep connections, with participants brainstorming practical ways to apply key insights to strengthen their own advocacy and organisational growth. A big vinaka vakalevu to all OPDs, partners, and CBM Australia for supporting this impactful initiative.

United Blind Persons of Fiji

The UBP band was revived through a project funded by Vodafone ATH Foundation and the Be Happy Music Club. Vodafone had immensely contributed by providing funds for the purchasing of the band's musical instruments including the sound system. Be Happy Music Club also stepped in to purchase a few other extra instruments. These tremendous supports have enabled the band to play at a total of ten invited gigs and also received allowances as a token of appreciation for their performance.

The band also released an original song during the International Day of Persons with Disability, titled "Nothing About Us Without Us" that was written by Tomasi Radakua. Tomasi is a member of the Fiji Psychiatric Survivors' Association of Fiji. The White Cane Awareness week was a •Through the Disability Rights Fund, the organization was able to conduct a situational survey out in the field to our members in the central and northern division. The DRF team also managed to secure their fund for the year 2025.

Finding Her Voice: Tirisa's First Encounter with Sign Language Support

During the recent SRH conducted by FDPF in Collaboration with PDF Outreach in Muanisolo Village, 11-year-old Tirisa Nade from Kadavu experienced a moment of inclusion she rarely finds in her daily life.



Deaf since birth and attending a mainstream school without an interpreter, Tirisa met a sign language interpreter for the first time at the workshop. She shared her joy in learning new signs like "mummy," "daddy," and "teacher," and expressed a heartfelt need for a teacher who can communicate in sign language.

Despite the challenges, she feels supported by her peers and continues to show incredible resilience. Tirisa's story is a touching reminder of the urgent need for accessible education for all children with disabilities.

Nuanua O Le Alofa (NOLA) was proud to be part of the "Growing Stronger Together" initiative led by the Pacific Disability Forum—an inspiring three-day journey of reflection, learning, and empowerment aimed at strengthening the capacity of Organisations of Persons with Disabilities (OPDs) across the Pacific.

As a mentor in this regional space, we were honored to share our story of building a resilient, inclusive, and rights-based disability movement in Samoa. The gathering also provided a valuable opportunity for us to contribute to the first regional dialogue on the new Pacific Disability Forum Strategy and the Pacific Regional Framework for Persons with Disabilities (PRFPD). As we prepare for the in-country phase of the mission in July, we carry forward the spirit of unity and shared leadership. We rise by lifting each other, and together, we are unstoppable.

Kiribati Deaf Association

During the Growing Stronger Together program, lotebwa shared how the Growing Stronger Together (GST) program has transformed their approach to leadership and operations. He admitted that before the trainings, they were unaware of key areas like compliance, due diligence, and internal controls, but now, thanks to GST and PDF, they are equipped with the knowledge they need.

He emphasized the importance of open conversations, within the team and with members, and how they now discuss issues transparently and support one another.

He even shared personal experiences that served as valuable lessons for all of us.

A standout moment? KDA's walls are lined with butcher paper reminders of what to do, and what not to do.

Even finance tips, the dos and don'ts, have become part of their everyday learning.



<u>Lavame'a Ta'e'iloa Disabled People Association Inc</u>

Rhema delivered an insightful presentation today under the theme "Put Your House in Order," guiding OPDs on how to build stronger systems for sustainability. He highlighted the importance of satisfying donors through transparency, visibility, and regular communication.

He also walked us through the organizational structure, who they are, what they do, their clients, challenges, accomplishments, and key priorities for 2025, including translating the Tonga Disability Act. He closed with a powerful reminder: "Let's talk, but more actions - let your actions speak for themselves."

Through the completion of their due diligence they are able to secure bigger funding to expand their work to the outer island. The importance of compliance for OPDs and we need the support of others.

Emerald can now sit comfortably, play, and enjoy her surroundings—proof that distance is no barrier to impact.


